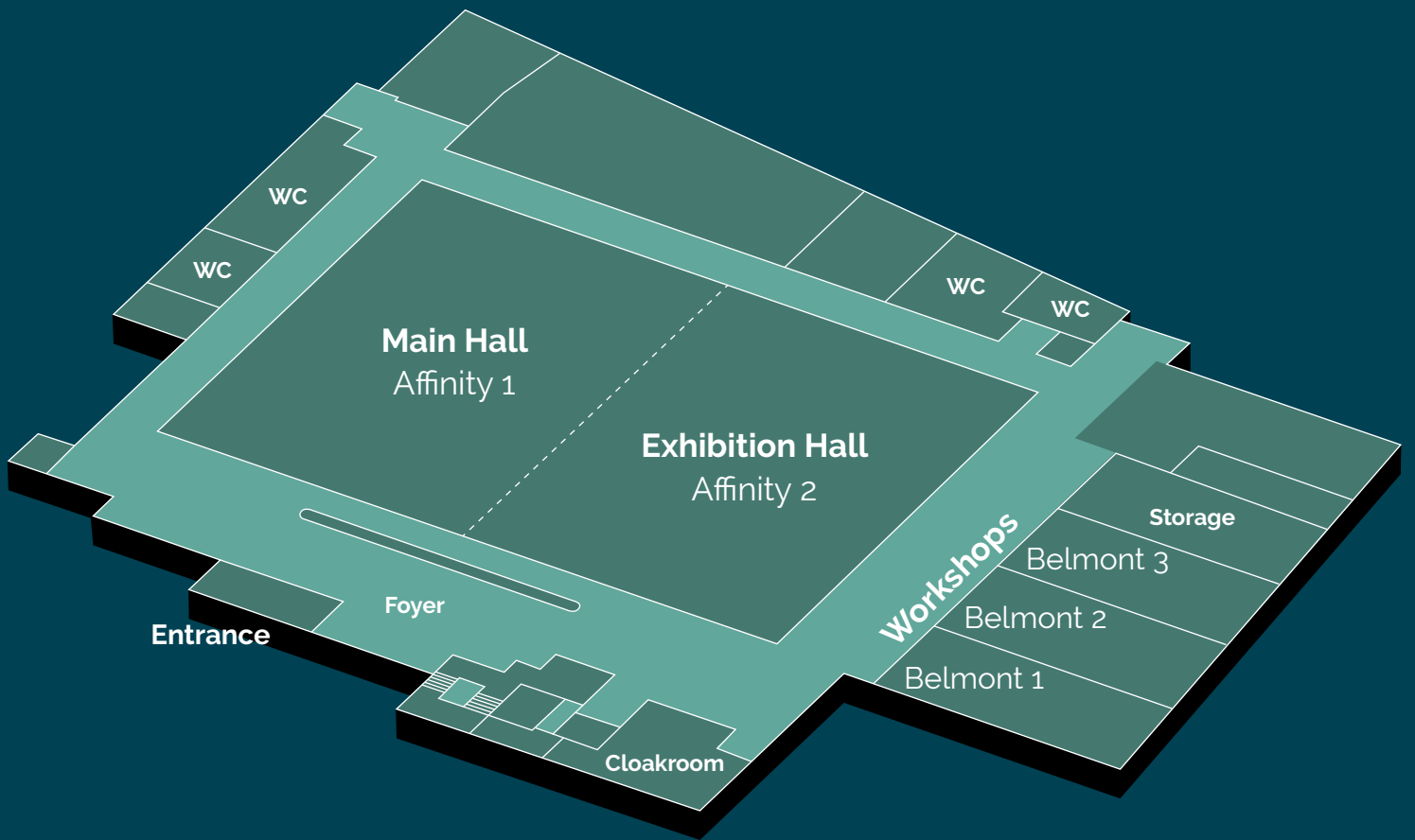

Welcome to the Employment and Skills Convention 2024

This year's Employment and Skills Convention could not be better timed. The General Election has been a time to debate the future, and now is the time to shape it.

The new government will chart a course toward the 2030s and needs to set us on the right path for sustainable growth and inclusion. But it faces a pretty stark set of challenges in doing so. Average wages are £12,000 per year below their pre-financial crisis trends, many public services are straining at the seams, and inequalities remain stark.

Access to learning, skills and employment are central to moving to a decade of renewal. Employment is still relatively high but has fallen since the pandemic, driven by a rise in economic inactivity due to long-term sickness. How can we help people make the most of longer working lives with access to good work? What can employers do to invest in skills for the future? It's a pleasure to welcome you to the Employment and Skills Convention and I hope you enjoy what will be a packed day.

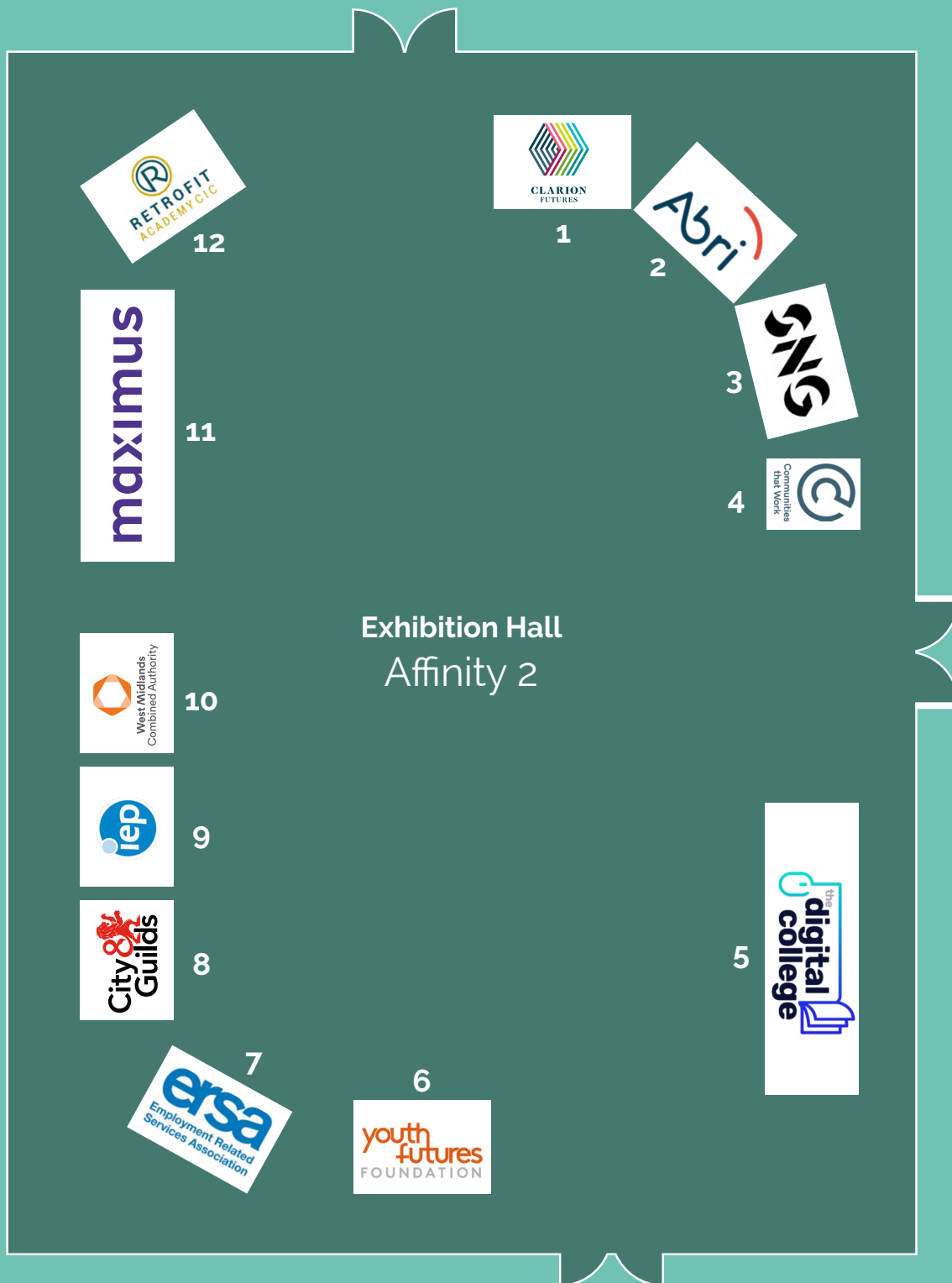

Some 1.7 million economically inactive people say they want a job, including 600,000 disabled people, yet just one-in-ten out-of-work older and disabled people get help to find work each year. It doesn't have to be this way: a step change in the scale and reach of employment support could bring the UK's employment rate up to 80% and boost the economy by £23 billion. <p>Advances in technology alongside longer working lives will see more people needing to change jobs and careers. But recent L&W research has found that fewer people are switching sectors than before the global financial crisis. <p>The ambition to create good green homes requires a vast new sector of workers. Green jobs will range from entry to advanced-level roles, with green skills in high demand as confidence grows and time runs out to meet net zero deadlines. If we are even to hope to meet the ambition of net zero in social housing by 2050, this should be the perfect opportunity to unite new jobs and skills pathways to more local people who want to work. But is it really that simple? Learning and Work Institute's blueprint for change

Five steps to improve prosperity and widen opportunity by improving access to lifelong learning and good work.



Get employers training

by broadening the apprenticeship levy into a Skills Levy and introducing a Skills Tax Credit, because employers are spending 26% less on training per employee than in 2005 and graduates are three times more likely to get training at work.



Help people into learning

by expanding the Lifelong Learning Entitlement in England to give more help and support, because the number of adults in learning has halved since 2010 with the biggest drops for those with the greatest need.



Support people to work

Introduce a Young Person's Guarantee

Build a better system

by joining up support, empowering local places and planning for the long-term, because adult skills funding in England is £1bn lower than in 2010 and policy is too fragmented.

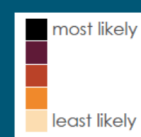

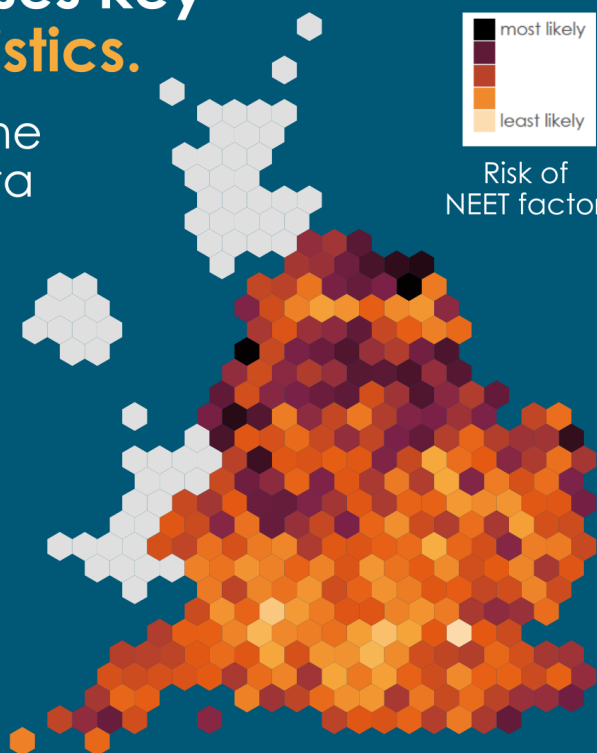
